Final Assessment : Sketchbook work and presentation of a range of print outcomes

Key words

Formal Elements	Elements used to make a piece of work - line, shape, space, form, tone, texture, pattern, colour and composition.
Collograph	A printmaking technique which involves taking a print from a collage relief, which includes a combination of different textures and materials
Mixed-Media	Artworks composed from a combination of different media or materials.
Relief	A surface projected from the supporting background
Mark-making	Mark making describes the different lines, dots, marks, patterns, and textures we create in an artwork. It can be loose and gestural or controlled and neat.
Conservation	Protecting our environment and the nature that lives in it
Ethics and Moral Philosophy	Ethics are moral principles that govern a persons conduct and behaviour. Moral philosophy contemplates what is right and wrong

Key words

Mixed Media	Artworks made from a combination of different media or materials.
Signifiers	A drawing, a word, or a photo that represents something, for example, a person and their interests.
Iconography	The visual images, symbols that are associated with a person and are represented in artworks.
Typography	The art of arranging written letters so they look creative.
Pattern	A pattern is a design in which lines, shapes, forms or colours are repeated. .
Collage	Gluing a wide range of materials - including pieces of paper, fabric, newspaper clippings, and sometimes readymade objects - to a surface.
Artist Inspiration	Looking at the work of others to inspire our own creative outcome.

Key words

Basic shapes	The initial marks of a drawing.
Proportion	Two or more items that work together. Using proportion correctly in your artwork makes your art pieces more realistic.
Symmetry	An image, object or design is mirrored equally through a vertical line.
Observation	To look closely and carefully at an object or image.
Tone	The lightness or darkness of something—this could be a shade, or how dark or light a colour appears.
Mark-making	Mark-making describes the different lines, dots, marks, patterns, and textures we create in an artwork. It can be loose and gestural or controlled and neat.
Influence	Looking at the work of others to inspire our work
