When we arrived after a 2-hour car journey and immediately got kitted-up to go climbing, wearing lots of layers and waterproofs. It was a very short walk to the climbing cliff, but it was very steep and mostly uphill.

When we arrived at the climbing cliff, it looked like the weather was on our side as it was very sunny while we ate our lunch. Funnily enough, as we put on harnesses and got hooked on to the belay, it started to pour with torrential rain. Strong winds also began, making it a lot harder to climb. The longer it took the wetter the wall became, which made it slippery and harder to grip on to. The higher we got the stronger the winds got. This made it very difficult to hear what the instructor was telling us.

On the first night, we went on a night-time navigation walk. We split into boys and girls, doing rock, paper, scissors to see who would go first. The first group would have to hide two cones in around the same area and the second group would have to find the cones and catch up to the first group before they got back to the hostel.

After we collected all the pieces of the broken rafts, we swam in the freezing cold water and jumped off the jetty. When we came out of the water, we were very cold. We dried off at the hostel and finished off the night with a film.

On the third day, we were split in half to take turns in going canoeing and walking. The walk was beautiful with amazing views of the waterfall, we even found small flowers that smelled like vanilla that were also edible.

Canoeing was very exciting. We experienced very harsh winds, making it quite hard to steer. We tied two canoes together to make sure they wouldn't tip over. We each had a paddle and had to paddle very hard to get past the winds.

We were surrounded by beautiful mountains and trees hung over the canal.

SPRING EQUINOX 2024

The spring equinox is here, marking the start of the season when the days grow longer and the trees slowly begin to get their lovely green colour.

Weather forecasters split the year into four seasons of three full months.

It helps them to easily compare seasons from one year to the next.

That means every year spring begins on 1st March and lasts until 31st May.

Then there's the astronomical season determined by the Earth's tilt as it travels around the Sun.

The astronomical season depends on the date of the spring equinox - that date comes later and varies a bit from year to year. This year, the spring equinox fell on **Wednesday 20th March**, and the astronomical spring lasts until the summer solstice.

The summer solstice will fall on **Thursday 20th June**.

What's an equinox, what's a solstice, and what's the difference between the two?

An equinox is when the Sun passes directly over the equator - the imaginary line half way between the North and South poles that runs round the Earth. There are two equinoxes each year, one in spring and one in autumn.



During an equinox, day and night are roughly equally as long as each other - in fact, the word equinox comes from two Latin words meaning "equal" and "night".

The equinoxes happen twice a year - on or around mid-March and mid-September.

Solstices on the other hand mark the longest and shortest days of the year and take place when the Sun reaches its most northerly and southerly points.
