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KINGSWOOD TRIP 2024

On the 8th May, Year 7 students embarked on an exciting residential trip to Kingswood. The primary aim of this trip was to engage in various activities, foster teamwork, and most importantly, have fun. The experience proved to be a memorable one for both students and teachers.



During our stay at Kingswood, we participated in a range of engaging and challenging activities designed to enhance our skills and provide enjoyment. These activities included Bushcraft, Crate Stack, and Jacobs Ladder.

Bushcraft taught students survival skills, including building shelters and starting fires, which helped them appreciate nature and develop practical skills.

Crate Stack required students to work in pairs or small groups to stack and climb crates as high as possible without toppling over. It emphasised balance, coordination, and teamwork.

Jacob's Ladder was a high ropes challenge where participants climbed a series of giant logs spaced increasingly far apart. This activity tested our physical strength, strategic thinking, and ability to support each other.

In music this term, all years have been playing the Taiko drums, instruments used in Japanese culture.

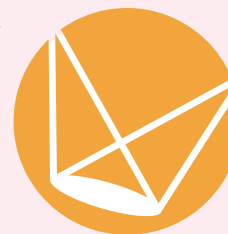


It has been amazing having these instruments with us over the past few weeks and a great opportunity to see everyone involved in such a physical type of music!

YEAR 7

Students in Year 7 drama have been learning about Elizabethan theatre and Shakespeare.

They are exploring the play Romeo and Juliet and how to perform opposing gangs on stage, as well as learning about The Globe Theatre and what it was like.

During one lesson, students used their Epraise learning about The Globe theatre and worked together to create a replica of the theatre in the drama studio. Students then created short role-play of the different types of people that would have attended the Globe Theatre to bring the space to life.

We learned about how different a theatre atmosphere was in the past and even had a short performance of the opening scene of Romeo and Juliet on stage. A really fun lesson with loads of engagement from our amazing Year 7 drama students.



YEAR 8

Students in Year 8 have been learning about Greek theatre this half-term with a particular focus on the chorus and analysing its effect on the audience.

This week, students tackled a piece of Greek text from Antigone and applied their new skills of choral movement and choral speech. We used mini whiteboards to practice how to analyse the effect of the choral movement and speech on the audience. Students used key words and sentence starters to develop their ability to talk about the effects on the audience. Well done Year 8 for trying a new theatre style!

YEAR 9

Students in Year 9 have been exploring how to create original drama from a stimulus in preparation for their coursework next year.

It has been wonderful to see so many students learning how to work together, and develop their creativity. One lesson was spent learning how to improvise and develop our imaginations, how to create character using costume and then learned how to respond to a poem as a starting point.

It is exciting to see how students are developing as theatre makers this year.

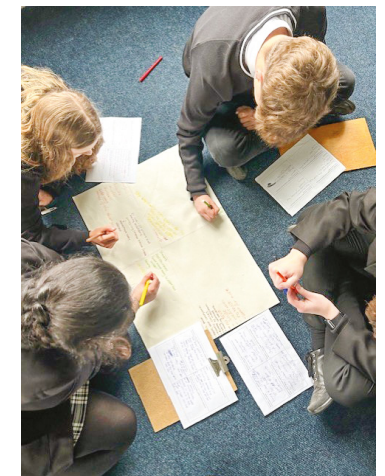

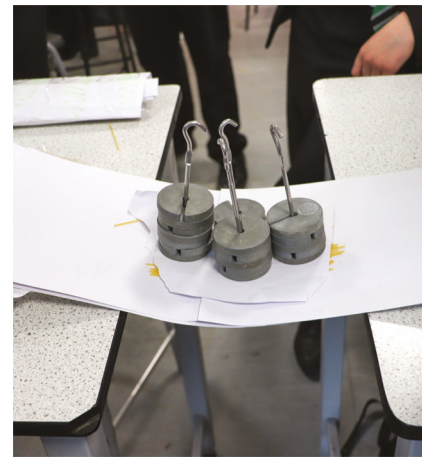
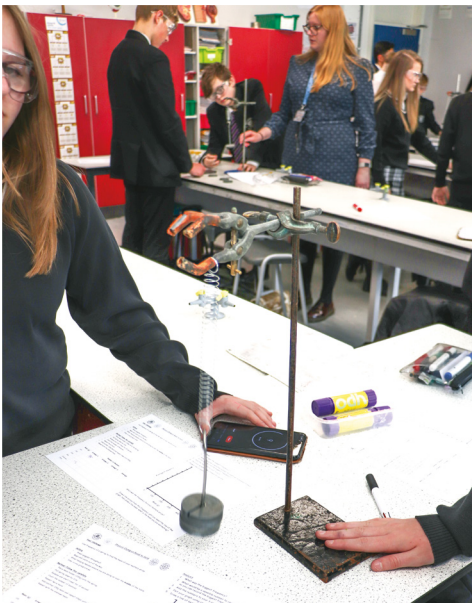


The Physics Olympics took place in lessons for Year 7, 8 and 9 last week.

- 4 slices crusty bread, thickly sliced
